### **MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF ARMAC** STEERING COMMITTEE

I am pleased to present this Annual Report as a comprehensive account of the activities and financial results of the ASEAN Regional Mine Action Center (ARMAC). Since its operationalization in February 2018, ARMAC has worked hard to reduce the impacts of mines and explosive remnants of war (ERW) through its projects and programs in the region. The Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) outbreak may have disrupted some of our work, but we were able to persevere, adapt to the new challenges, and carry on with our mandates and functions.

### **Highlights of the Year**

In 2021, several projects which were endorsed in 2020 came to fruition. ARMAC achieved one of its busiest years to-date. The increase in the size of the project portfolio owed much to new funding approvals received from the Governments of Italy, the People's Republic of China, New Zealand and the Republic of Korea.

- ARMAC kicked off its implementation of the *Enhance* Victim Assistance Programme in ASEAN Member States (AMS) which will run until early 2024. The project aims to establish a regional victim assistance network that will facilitate assistance to the victims of explosive ordnance in AMS, particularly those in the affected memberstates. A consultative workshop was organized in Cambodia in 2021. Similar workshops are planned for 2022 in Lao PDR, Thailand and Viet Nam. A regional workshop will be organized next year.
- ► ARMAC also implemented the Enhancing Regional Cooperation and Resource Mobilization Capacity in Mine/ERW in ASEAN Mine Action which promotes regional cooperation and resource mobilization. An online technical working group meeting was held in December to discuss the potential for developing a blueprint for the region. A senior-level meeting will be organized in 2022 as a culminating activity for the project.
- ► ARMAC also rolled out its Strengthen Gender Equality and Empowerment in Mine Action in



the Mine/ERW Affected AMS Project which aims to study gender equality and empowerment in mine action programme in the ASEAN region, while building capacity in gender equality and empowerment through training sessions and knowledge sharing. A joint landmark ARMAC-Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining (GICHD) publication will be launched in 2022 as part of this project.

- ARMAC also received its first technical assistance The grant project, Strengthening Institutional and Staff Capacities of Humanitarian Mine Action Entities in the ASEAN Region. will help ARMAC develop a long-term strategy framework to strengthen its operational and programatic priorities.
- During the year, ARMAC launched its Friends of ARMAC (FoA) Network which aims to expand its reach and enable support from interested stakeholders, including the AMS and ASEAN partners, private sector, as well as international organizations. The FOA event is thus, envisaged to becoming a regular feature in the years to come.
- ARMAC also forged new partnerships with the signing of various agreements between national, regional and international entities. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed between ARMAC and the GICHD, and Norwegian

People's Aid to support ARMAC's broad mandate and functions. ARMAC also signed co-implementation agreements with Humanity & Inclusion, Singapore Health Services, and the Cambodian Mine Action and Victim Assistance Authority (CMAA) to support the activities of the Enhance Victim Assistance Programme.

All of these were achieved in spite of the disruption caused by COVID-19. ARMAC continued its operation and engagement with its stakeholders either through physical and virtual platforms. In 2021, ARMAC also initiated the organizing of a hybrid format for its workshops and meetings.

### ARMAC in 2022 and Beyond

Since its nascent operation in 2018, ARMAC has been making good progress in promoting collective actions to alleviate the impacts of landmines and ERW which we all should be proud of. Let us be reminded that the protection of human security is an integral part of the ASEAN Community Building efforts. Therefore, ARMAC should continue using a multilateral approach to encourage cooperation and the sharing of best practices. ARMAC must also continue to mobilize its stakeholders, including the civil societies, private sector, regional and international communities to widen the coverage and deepen the effect of awareness-raising, victims' assistance and rehabilitation, and sustain efforts towards the reduction of the impacts of landmines and ERW throughout the ASEAN region.

It is my hope that the new torch bearer, His Excellency Mr. Ung Rachana, will continue to ensure that ARMAC will remain agile and responsive of the needs of all the ASEAN Member States of which I am confident that he will. Together with our 10 AMSs, donors, and development partners, I remain hopeful and confident that ARMAC together with the Government of Cambodia as 2022 ASEAN Chair will be able to deliver its mandate and functions with success.

Finally, I wish my successor and the incoming chair, a productive and rewarding 2022!

### **FOREWORD**



This annual report marks the completion of the third full year of operations for the ASEAN Regional Mine Action Centre (ARMAC), and the culmination of its inaugural workplan. It has been an honor to have been entrusted with overseeing ARMAC during these formative years, and to have been afforded stewardship over an organization with such great potential. But before I delve more into what that potential might entail, I would first like to highlight some of ARMAC's accomplishments over the past vear.

Aligned with ARMAC's mandate to facilitate appropriate medical and rehabilitation assistance for victims of mine and explosive remnants of war (ERW) upon request from the affected AMS, ARMAC this year launched an ambitious 3-year project to enhance the victim assistance programmes across the ASEAN region through the establishment of a regional victim assistance network. ARMAC also sought to provide useful information and resources on cross-cutting issues that are common to all mine/ERW-affected ASEAN Member States (AMS). One such project was entitled Strengthen Gender Equality and Empowerment in Mine Action in the Mine/ERW Affected AMS. Initiated this year, it promises to share international best practice on the themes of gender mainstreaming across AMS.

More recently, ARMAC hosted the inaugural Technical Working Group (TWG) meeting on the project, Enhancing Regional Cooperation and Resource Mobilization Capacity in Mine/ERW in ASEAN which validates ARMAC's position as a regional entity aspiring to bring and promoting collaboration among each AMS. We have continued to operate in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic via our hybrid and online workshops and meetings. We will continue to do so if that means that we have to be more innovative to reach out and engage with our partners, and stakeholders.

The common thread running throughout all of these activities is leveraging the depth and breadth of knowledge and experience present across the ASEAN region. While the nature of mine/ERW contamination is diverse across the region, I am confident that, collectively, we have decades of experience and the human capital necessary to address these problems. In this, I see the true potential of ARMAC, acting as a catalyst to ensure that, together, the mine action programmes and actors across the region form to be greater than the sum of their parts.

However, to achieve this vision, the next three years will require a greater level of engagement from the AMS through a long-term strategy and well coordinated multilateral efforts. I encourage all national mine action programmes to engage openly with ARMAC, to come to see ARMAC as a resource, and as a center for excellence. I encourage our donors and development partners to help us build a long-term and sustainable financing infrastructure, and strengthen ARMAC and AMS staff capacities through by supporting us with capacity building initiatives.

In summary, I am tremendously proud of what ARMAC has achieved in 2021, and I am both excited and optimistic about what the future holds for ARMAC in the coming years.

**Enhance awareness** programs on the dangers of ERW among affected communities.




Facilitate appropriate medical and rehabilitation assistance for victims of ERW, upon request from the affected AMS.



### **ARMAC Permanent Secretariat**

The ARMAC Permanent Secretariat (PS) is led by the Executive Director. Two technical officers provide support in the areas of mine action and corporate affairs. From time to time, project staff, interns, and volunteers are recruited to provide technical, research and administrative support to the PS.

The ARMAC Steering Committee (SC) provides oversight and guidance on the work of the PS. The Steering Committee is comprised of senior officials from the Ministries of Foreign Affairs and Defense of each ASEAN Member State. The PS reports to the SC.



### **2021 MILESTONES**

The solid groundwork laid in the last three years made 2021 a productive year for ARMAC, despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the travel restrictions associated with it. ARMAC began implementing several projects, including its current flagship project, Enhance Victim Assistance Programme for AMS. ARMAC forged new partnerships with international and national organizations through the signing of Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs), co-implementation agreements among others. It also launched its Friends of ARMAC (FoA) Network which promoted ARMAC and extended its reach among the development community, and even to the private sector. More importantly, ARMAC was able to reach out and engage more actively with the countries and region it serves. Going forward, ARMAC will continue to be guided by its three-year work plan to ensure alignment with the identified needs of the AMS, and the ASEAN Political-Security Blueprint.

### Partner engagement and communications

ARMAC continues to make significant progress in fulfilling its commitment to enhance its visibility and reputation by strengthening partner relations and engaging with potential partners and donors.

ARMAC sought support with various stakeholders

including senior representatives and officials from embassies, international and national NGOs, academic and research think tanks and other mine action organizations through bilateral and multilateral meetings. Most of the meetings/ discussions led to collaborations, as highlighted throughout this report.

### **ASEAN Member States**

ARMAC paid courtesy visits to AMS officials. In early 2021, ARMAC paid a courtesy call to Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation of Cambodia. ARMAC also met with the 2021 chair, and newly appointed Ambassador of the Philippines, and the Ambassadors of Lao PDR and Malaysia.

ARMAC also collaborated with the Government of Indonesia through the Embassy of Indonesia in Cambodia to organize a hybrid regional workshop on achieving sustainable goals.

ARMAC also organized 3 Steering Committee Meetings, in hybrid format due to the health threat posed by the ongoing pandemic. Despite the absence of a physical meeting, the SC meetings provided a useful platform to update members on the progress of ARMAC operations and programmes. The meetings also deliberated on arising new issues, and projects that require consensus and approval among the SC members.



### **MOU Signing**

ARMAC also signed memorandums of understanding with the GICHD and NPA Myanmar in January. Both MOUs will allow ARMAC to collaborate on common grounds and interests. The partnership with GICHD aims to expand ARMAC's work on risk management technology, gender mainstreaming, and risk education. The partnership with NPA Myanmar is intended to bring together regional knowledge and expertise to facilitate the setting up of a mine action sector in Myanmar. ARMAC also began its preliminary discussions with the UNDP Cambodia and the Sir Bobby Charlton Foundation in the 4th quarter of 2021. ARMAC anticipates signing of new partnerships with both organizations during the first quarter of 2022. Subsequently, ARMAC also signed several MOUs and co-implementation agreements through its ongoing projects.

ARMAC and partners agreed to host FOA events on a regular basis. Cambodia accepted to host next year's meeting while taking on the ASEAN chairmanship.



### Staff capacity development, workshops and trainings

Staff attended workshops and meetings organized by international and national partners. Programmes staff took part in the joint Seoul Cyber University and MAG International online training course on Capacity Building on Integrative Management and Coordination of National Mine Action Actors in the Mekong Region. Staff also attended workshops and trainings on risk education, victim assistance, gender which were organized by CMAA, HI and GICHD.

ARMAC presented its ongoing work in the sector and region during a side event in Geneva. ED also met with ASEAN. Cambodia and Swiss government representatives where he discussed about ARMAC's work. ARMAC ED also participated in the 19th Meeting of the States Parties, as part of ARMAC's efforts to promote visibility.

### **Programme**

In 2021, ARMAC received approval for its largest project to date, the *Enhance Victim Assistance Programme for ASEAN Member States* valued at \$2.06 million from the Government of the Republic of Korea through the ASEAN-Korea Cooperation Fund (AKCF). ARMAC also received approvals for the implementation of *Enhancing Regional Cooperation and Resource Mobilization Capacity in Mine/ERW in ASEAN Mine Action* and the Strengthen Gender Equality and Empowerment in Mine Action in the Mine/ERW Affected AMS Projects from the Governments of the People's Republic of China and Italy respectively.

ARMAC also received its first technical assistance grant from the Government of New Zealand which will facilitate the development of a long-term strategy framework for ARMAC including its vision-mission statement, and an updated 3-year rolling workplan.


ARMAC also received financial support from the Government of the Republic of Indonesia to jointly organize a regional workshop on *Achieving Sustainable Development Goals*. The workshop called for alignment and harmonization of the 2020 Agenda and the imperative to leave no one behind within the region, thus linking humanitarian mine action with longer-term recovery, social-environmental-economic development, and peace.

The Enhance awareness programs on the dangers of Mine/Explosive Remnants of War (ERW) among ASEAN Member States Project was extended in 2021 to upgrade ARMAC's website and organize of the Mine Awareness Day in 2022.

Figures 1 and 2 show the active project portfolio, and the distribution of ARMAC projects according to mine action pillars, respectively.



is still awaiting approval from the Government of Turkey. The project on *Enhancing Cross Border Cooperation and Assistance on Humanitarian Mine Action in the ASEAN Region* commenced its early rounds of discussion with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Thailand, ICRC, and NPA.

The proposed regional workshop regarding the establishment of a mine action sector in the Philippines is now scheduled for April 2022, while the planned workshop for Myanmar is still on hold due to the ongoing political situation in the country. The following section discusses the achievements made by each project during the last 12 months.

### • Enhance Victim Assistance Programme for ASEAN **Member States**

ARMAC's flagship project implementation kicked off its implementation in January. The project recruited key personnel, a project manager and a project officer to provide support. A Korean intern was also recruited. The project met some delays in its first six months but managed to complete some of its target deliverables.

### **Enhance Victim Assistance Programme for ASEAN Member States**

- 1. Promote the establishment of victim assistance network as a regional platform for various stakeholders among AMS.
- 2. Assist AMS on victim-assistance and victim assistance-related knowledge sharing, need/s and resource/s assessment and mobilization.
- 3. Assess the needs of ERW (mine/ UXO) victims in affected AMS for further assistance.
- 4. Assist AMS in providing psychosocial support to ERW victims.
- 5. Undertake research on (i) ERW (Mine/UXO) Victim Assistance Inclusive Services in Cambodia, and (ii) Community Perspectives of Humanitarian ERW (Mine/UXO) Action in Lao PDR and Viet Nam.

### • Enhancing Regional Cooperation and Resource **Mobilization Capacity in Mine/ERW in ASEAN Mine Action**

At present, there are limited regional mechanisms in place for landmine1 and ERW affected AMS to share knowledge and experience on best practices and develop strategies to work cohesively towards a minefree ASEAN region. There are also limited means to mobilize resources at the regional level. The presence of a cooperative regional mechanism is envisaged to provide a space where AMS and partners can respond in a coordinated, timely and effective manner to the needs of mine-affected countries and the region; support, build and leverage off the collective efforts of the mine action sector community at large; and strengthen the credibility of regional and national stakeholders in terms of transparency, accountability, and effectiveness.



### • Strengthen Gender Equality and Empowerment in Mine Action in the Mine/ERW Affected AMS

Mine action organizations collect large amounts of socioeconomic data on the impact of activities such as land release, often based on requirements from donor organizations or national authorities. However, understanding how these activities contribute towards gender equality remains limited, especially in relation to housing, land and property. Given that the promotion of gender equality (and other agendas such as disability inclusion) is of high importance to donors, affected states, and mine action organizations, the sector should improve at demonstrating impact using the data and resources already available.

ARMAC engaged GICHD to undertake a joint research study on the mine action sector's approach towards the monitoring and reporting of the gendered impact of land release. The study will be conducted in selected ASEAN countries with case studies highlighting systems, practices and results. The study aims to encompass the work of relevant actors and investigate and demonstrate links between mine action and the broader gender equality and inclusion normative framework, such as the SDG 5.

### . Enhance awareness programs on the dangers of Mine/Explosive Remnants of War (ERW) among ASEAN Member States

ARMAC was established by the ASEAN Leaders in 2012 to assist the ASEAN Member States (AMS) to collectively tackle the humanitarian aspects of mine/ERW through an integrated approach of experiences sharing, skills and other capacity building activities. The MRE project was developed to address ARMAC's mandate, "enhance awareness programs on the dangers of ERW among affected communities". Likewise, ARMAC's Work Plan 2017-2018 also identified Mine Risk Education (MRE) as one of its key programme activities.

The project is now more than eighty percent completed, and is due for closing in 2022.

### • Strengthening Institutional and Staff **Capacities of Humanitarian Mine Action Entities in the ASEAN Region**

The Project addressed ARMAC's strategic priorities to date which include the development of a strategy plan for the next five years and an associated three-year rolling work plan. By putting in place a long-term strategy for ARMAC, ARMAC will be able to better coordinate regional humanitarian mine action efforts in the region. 

### Completed Project

ARMAC together with the Government of Indonesia through its Embassy in Cambodia organized a hybrid workshop on Achieving Sustainable and Inclusive Development in Landmine and ERW-Affected Countries on 1 July 2021. The workshop deliberated on issues toward achieving inclusive and sustainable development in the ASEAN countries including the following: (i) consolidation of concepts relating to sustainable and inclusive landmine affected areas and engaged participants in an in-depth discussion of the major issues affecting the achievement of this objective; (ii) familiarized participants with integrated approaches for applying these concepts, with a particular focus on the humanrights based approach and global citizenship education; and provide participants with workable solutions and tools; and discussed potential partnerships with regional landmines organization, local community groups, and other stakeholders, in order to foster the establishment and development of national mine-action capacities in countries where mines and explosive remnants of war constitute a serious threat to the safety, health and lives of the civilian population, or an impediment to social and economic development at the national and local levels. The workshop fulfilled Indonesia's commitment to support ARMAC, specifically on enhancing awareness programmes on the dangers of mine/ERW.









Over 90 participants attended the hybrid workshop. Senior officials from the government of Cambodia and Indonesia were present, and gave keynote speeches. The workshop brought together representatives from national governments and bilateral and international organizations.

### **WAY FORWARD**

2022 presents the opportunity for ARMAC to reflect on its three years' progress to-date, and to consider where it can offer additional value to the Mine Action community within the ASEAN Region in the future. ARMAC exists to serve the diverse stakeholders within the sector, and as such, ARMAC has a busy consultative agenda over the coming 12 months. Foremost among these activities will be the consultative process which will accompany the formulation of the ARMAC 5-year strategy document. Additionally, the upcoming Technical Working Group meeting, Regional High-Level meeting and Victim Assistance Network meetings will all serve to inform ARMAC's strategic intent going forward and to ensure that is aligned with stakeholders' needs. Likewise, ARMAC anticipates the receipt of the external evaluation report on ARMAC's imminent progress towards achieving its functions and mandates in the three years since its inception. It is hoped that, once finalized, this report will also yield important considerations to determine the optimal path forward for ARMAC in the coming years.

Notwithstanding what promises to be a pivotal year in setting its future direction, ARMAC still maintains an ambitious and full calendar of activities during 2022. The workplan 2022-2024, attached in the following pages, lays out this plan in detail - expanding on the activities that ARMAC will undertake in pursuit of its ten stated objectives in the coming three-year period.

An area in which ARMAC identifies significant future potential is under the mine action pillar of Advocacy. ARMAC's role in advocacy is to bring to the fore pressing regional mine action issues; ensuring they find a place on the agenda in the appropriate national and international fora, and bringing together the relevant interlocutors to resolve issues and to arrive at mutually beneficial agreements. As a recognized and neutral entity under the auspices of ASEAN, ARMAC's role is to broker and facilitate regional and national dialogue, and seeks to make available the latest research and expertise to inform any discussion.




